

In this story about the perils of popularity the courage of nonconformity, and the thrill of first love, an eccentric student named Stargirl changes Mica High Schoo forever.






father.



Summer Project - A Road Map to Success First Stop: 6th Grade

Welcome!

Hello rising sixth graders, and welcome to Baldwin Middle School! Your sixth grade teachers can't wait to begin working with you. While we want you to enjoy your summer vacation, taking a "brain break" for the *entire* summer can cause you to lose some of the skills that you worked hard on learning this year.

This summer we would like you to read **ONE** title from the 6th Grade Summer Reading Book List or select a book of your choice. We encourage you to read as many additional titles as you wish. As you read, be sure to stop and jot your ideas and noticings on the book, asking yourself, "In the face of adversity, what causes some individuals to prevail while others fail?" In other words, "When faced with difficulties, why do some people overcome them, while others may not?"

Taking notes on your reading helps you to understand the story and to think about its connection to life and the world in which we live. It will also help you remember the story when you return to school.

Please know that at the end of September, you will be participating in a Socratic Seminar. Each student will be sharing their views and ideas based on the book they chose to read. Your teacher will ask you to reflect on the seminar as an in - class assignment. This will count as a written grade towards your first - quarter grade entered into eSchool for your sixth grade year.

Task and Resources

<u>Task:</u> Read one book and begin reflecting on the essential question:

• In the face of adversity, what causes some individuals to prevail while others fail?" In other words, "When faced with difficulties, why do some people overcome them, while others may not?"

In order to complete this task, you will need to do the following:

- 1. Read *one* text of your choice from the *6th Grade Summer Reading Book List* or **a book of your choice** that aligns to the above essential question.
- 2. Prepare to participate in a Socratic Seminar when you return to school by:
 - ☐ Reflecting on the essential question: In the face of adversity, what causes some individuals to prevail while others fail?" (When faced with difficulties, what causes some people to overcome them, while others may not?)
 - ☐ **Annotating** Stop and Jot your noticings and ideas on post-it notes or in your notebook.
 - ☐ Choosing and writing down *one* quote from the beginning, middle, and end of the text that is relevant and made an impact on you. At least three quotes in total.

- Annotate by "stopping and jotting" important ideas or noticings as they read on post-its or in a reader's notebook, or any other note-taking system that works for them.
- Choosing and writing down one quote from the beginning, middle, and end of the text that is relevant and made an impact on you. At least three guotes in total.
- Learners should also be able to answer the questions on the bookmark that is included in this packet.

The books suggested on the list are available at the Baldwin Public Library. Please encourage your child to engage with the books actively by discussing the plot, characters, and their thoughts about the story. We also recommend encouraging them to explore other books of their interest throughout the summer.
